## Space Needle's "Love is in the Air" Fundraiser Returns A Valentine's Day Benefit for the American Heart Association

**Seattle, Wash.** – The Space Needle's "Love is in the Air" fundraiser returns, offering participants a chance to take their love to new heights on Valentine's Day. For a \$100 donation to benefit the American Heart Association, donors' laser-created love notes will be projected onto the Space Needle's (northwest facing) legs, located 300-400' in the air. The American Heart Association will receive 100% of the donations raised.

Each "Love is in the Air" message will scroll on the Seattle landmark between 6:00 p.m. and 10 p.m. on Wednesday, Feb. 14. With love, sometimes timing is everything. With that in mind, lovebirds now have the option to select a timeslot for their message to appear. Timeslots are limited and are available on a first come, first served basis. Limited to the first 800 messages submitted, each note is restricted to a maximum of 40 characters (including spaces) and must be received by 4 p.m. on Monday, February 12. Messages that are perceived to be commercial, political, religious, lewd, inflammatory, controversial or inappropriate will not be accepted.

By participating in the "Love is in the Air" fundraiser, donors are not only elevating their Valentine's Day experience, but are also funding the fight against heart disease and stroke. One in three people is currently living with cardiovascular disease. The good news is about 80 percent of heart disease and stroke may be prevented with education and lifestyle changes.
